BRIEF NOTES

The main goal for this typeface was to adapt the characteristics from the original cut of Caslon which have been a favorite typeface fro many years. I wanted the contrast to be a bit higher than most of the existing versions on the market.

One of the best sources for the original cuts is a facsimile print – Caslon – printed in 1924. All the original prints in this book were done by the Caslon Type Foundry, and states on the title page; Caslon old face, roman & italic. Cast entirely from matrices produced from the original punches engraved in the early part of the Eighteenth Century in Chiswell Street, London by William Caslon. I was lucky to find this book in an antique book store some years ago and ever since I've been eager to do Replay.

Now even if this typeface looks very much like Caslon, some choices have been made in other directions. The Italic weights are a bit more narrow than the original. Upright medium and bold are made with my personal taste of blackness. All uprights also carry small caps and several sets of numbers, ligatures and alternates. These things are almost a necessity in todays typography.

Another important charcter of this typeface is the fact that I've made some detailed "odd" or "uneven" points and curves. This is to capture the feeling of old days. It will not stand out much (or at all) when used in traditional text sizes. But I think even so, it gives the typeface an extra touch. Regular also includes an extra headline weight, which is more delicate and elegant.

Ornaments and symbols are collected from various sources. Some are traditional for Caslon, others just seemed to fit in for this era.




